College Planning: 12th Grade

Want to know if you're on track in the college application process? This checklist shows you what you should be doing, and when.

When you complete steps marked with * you may be eligible for College Board Opportunity Scholarships. Learn more at: cb.org/opportunity.

FALL

- Strengthen Your College List* Meet with a counselor about your college choices and. If you've not yet done so, download college applications and financial alf forms. Make sure you have a balanced list of academic safety, fit, and reach schools. Plan to visit as many of these colleges as possible.
- Create a master list or calendar that includes:
 Tests you'll take and their fees, dates, and registration deadlines
- College application due dates
- Required financial aid application forms and their deadlines (aid applications may be due before college applications)
- Other materials you'll need (recommendations, transcripts, etc.)
- · Your high school's application processing deadlines
- Ask a counselor to help you request a fee waiver if you can't afford application or test fees.
- ☐ Improve Your Score*: Many seniors retake the SAT in the fall. Additional coursework and practice with Official SAT Practice on Khan Academy* since your last test could help you boost your performance. Plus you already know what to expect on test day.
- Be sure to have your SAT scores sent to the colleges to which you are applying.

- Complete the FAFSA*: To apply for most financial aid, you'll need to complete the FAFSA. Oct. 1 is the first day you can file the FAFSA.
- Complete the CSS Profile: CSS Profile" is an online application used by certain colleges and scholarship programs to determine eligibility for their aid dollars.
- Prepare early decision/early action or rolling admission applications as soon as possible. Nov. 1–15: Colleges may require test scores and applications between these dates for early decision admission.
- Ask a counselor or teacher for recommendations if you need them. Give each teacher or counselor an outline of your academic record and your extracurricular activities. For each recommendation, provide a stamped, addressed envelope and any college forms required.
- Write first drafts and ask teachers and others to read them if you're submitting essays. If you're applying for early decision, finish the essays for that application now.
- Apply to College*: Submit your applications to the schools that you want to attend.
- Ask counselors to send your transcripts to colleges. Give counselors the proper forms at least two weeks before the colleges require them.

WINTER

- Keep photocopies as you finish, and send your applications and essays.
- Give the correct form to your counselor if the college wants to see second-semester grades.
- Have your high school send a transcript—it is sent separately by mail to colleges if you apply online to colleges.

SPRING

- Keep active in school. If you are waitlisted, the college will want to know what you have accomplished between the time you applied and the time you learned of its decision.
- ↓ Visit your final college before accepting. You should receive acceptance letters and financial aid offers by mid-April. Notify your counselor of your choice. If you have questions about housing offers, talk to your counselor or call the college.
- Inform every college of your acceptance or rejection of the offer of admission and/or financial aid by May 1. Colleges cannot require your deposit of your commitment to attend before May 1. Talk to your counselor or adviser if you have questions.
- Send your deposit to one college only.
- Take any AP* Exams. Show what you've learned in your AP classes. A successful score could even earn you credit, advanced placement, or both in college.

- Waitlisted by a college? If you intend to enroll if you are accepted, tell the admission director your intent and ask how to strengthen your application. Need financial aid? Asic whether funds will be available if you're accepted.
- Work with a counselor to resolve any admission or financial aid problems.
- Ask your high school to send a final transcript to your college.
- Review your financial aid awards: Not all financial aid awards are the same, so it's important to choose the aid package that's best for you and your family. Be sure to note what you have to do to continue receiving financial aid from year to year, and how your aid might change in future years.



TOP COLLEGE APP MISTAKES

- Missing a deadline
- Misspelling and gramma
- Not reading carefully
- Letting Mom or Dad fill out the app
- Not submitting
- Forgetting signatures
- Inappropriate email/not checking regularly
- Not following up to make sure your app is complete

SAT SCORES



- Very important: We do not list your SAT score on your transcript.
- This means that you MUST request for your official SAT score to be sent from SAT to the college you are applying to
- You can do this through your student account on <u>www.collegeboard.org</u>
 - If you are taking the SAT a second (or third or fourth) time, you can always let a college know that you have taken the SAT again and that your score will be sent to them as soon as it is available.

- Check admission requirements, many colleges/universities may be test optional







PERSONAL STATEMENT

- Don't spend time talking about your GPA or class rank. They can see that on your transcript.
- Talk about why you want to be there, what you will bring to that campus and other significant/unique qualities about you.
- It is also an opportunity to explain any poor grades that may have occurred (TIP: <u>NEVER</u> say "I'm a bad test taker.").
- You may use the same personal statement for multiple colleges but EDIT CAREFULLY!!

GETTING STARTED Schoollinks GETTING STARTED

- Complete Personal Details
 - Use YOUR home address
- Fee Waiver (do you qualify?)
 - If you receive free/reduced lunch, you qualify for an application fee waiver. *You will be asked to verify this*!
- FERPA Waiver
 - Waiving your rights lets colleges know that you don't intend to read your recommendations, which helps reassure colleges that the letters are candid and truthful.

COMMON APPLICATION

Common App Link: <u>https://www.commonapp.org/</u>

- You will only fill out a Common Application if you are applying to more than one school within the 900 schools associated with common app.
 - To see a list of schools that use Common Application, click here
- Select the colleges you want to apply to
 - Generally, only worth doing for 3 or more, or exclusive
- Many schools may require other supplemental forms
 - Be sure to check all materials that must be submitted to each school you're applying to!
- You will request letters of recommendation on SchooLinks.

COMMON APPLICATION

- If you are applying via Common App, be sure to link your Common App and SchooLinks accounts: Link your SchooLinks & Common App accounts
- It is mandatory to link your Common App account with your SchooLinks account so counselors and teachers can send supporting documents (transcripts and letters of recommendation) to your Common App schools.
 - In SchooLinks, go to Colleges -> College Applications and click Link Common App Account
 - Follow the prompts on the screen to link your account

• Additionally, you need to complete the following three steps in your Common Application to finish the linking process:

- Add at least one college to your Common App under College Search
- Enter 'Central High School' as your high school under Education
 - Complete the <u>FERPA waiver</u> under My Colleges \rightarrow Recommenders and FERPA

After your Common App & SchooLinks accounts are synced, the colleges/universities added on your Common App account will automatically be imported into SchooLinks. If you add additional colleges/universities at a later date, they will be updated & added to your SchooLinks account nightly.

STARTING THE APPLICATION

After you click *Add Application* it will take you to the school page. You will answer the questions to the best of your ability.

You will select either Common App -or-School specific online app. (Either choice is fine)

Both choices will take you through questions and requirements.

Note- Some schools may only have one option.

USING SchooLinks



- Add the college to your application list on SchooLinks:

- If you are applying via Common App, be sure to link your Common App and SchooLinks accounts: <u>Link your SchooLinks & Common App accounts</u>
- Once you have added a college to your application list in SchooLinks, any required documents from counselors (like initial and midyear transcripts) are automatically requested.

REQUESTING YOUR TRANSCRIPT

<u>How to Request Transcripts be Sent to a College</u> Once you have added a college to your application list in SchooLinks, <u>any required documents from counselors (like initial and midyear transcripts) are automatically requested</u>.

Self-Reported Transcripts

- Some college applications require students to submit a self-report transcript. In this case, students do NOT need to order an official transcript at the time of application.
- The students will enter all of their courses and grades on the application. This information needs to be entered exactly as it appears on the student's transcript. Therefore, we recommend using an unofficial copy of your transcripts to complete this section.
- Please note that you will still need to send a final official transcript via SchooLinks to the college you decide to attend. This happens in May of senior year.



- Read the application directions
 - If the school doesn't ask for one, don't send one!
- Ask your recommender face-to-face
- Complete request in SchooLinks
- Allow 2-3 weeks
- Thank the writer

Once you add the college application, the required documents (transcript, counselor recommendation) will be auto-requested to your School Counselor

RECOMMENDATION FROM TEACHER

After you complete the questions on SchooLinks or Common App. This is where you can add a Recommendation.

If the school allows it you can click 'Add Recommender' then search for your teachers name.

This will notify the teacher and allow them to type in or load a PDF of the recommendation.
